Riga, 21 March 1901

Dear Colleague,

The omniscient telegraph will inform you about the preposterous, albeit actual academic events of the last few months that have equally impacted all universities in Russia and completely poisoned academic life.

With regards to your thesis, "Inorganic Fermentation", I would like to express my praise.
